


WOTL MATTERS

From all I've heard it was a resounding success, I know I sure loved it!


At this time of year it becomes even more acutely apparent that many living in nursing homes crave opportunities to be swept away from the everyday routines.



We now have several women on our list of helpers who would be happy to help with other needs such as small


sewing jobs, making a meal, walking your dog, helping organize drawers or cupboards, cleaning a fridge and many other small jobs around the house.



BURIED TREASURE

In Prince Edward County there is a ferry which connects two parts of highway 33. The Glenora Ferry runs every 15 minutes or so (on the half hour in winter) between a flat peninsula at the eastern end to the side of a cliff on the west (PEC side). What most ferry passengers do not realize is that when they reach the western shore, they are within throwing distance of a lost treasure. Rumour has it that there is a cave some 50 feet from the top, which can only be reached by a narrow path along the face of the cliff.

Glenora Treasure

The Seven Years War was fought in many parts of the new world in the mid-eighteenth century, between the English and the French. Some more famous battles included the siege of Louisburg, in Nova Scotia and a lesser-known skirmish between two Generals named Wolfe and Montcalm on the Plains of Abraham. In or about the year of 1759, a French admiral watched from a cave above what is today the Glenora Ferry, while the British and French fleets fought one of the last marine battles of the war. Fearing defeat, the admiral hid all his treasure in the room-sized cave and sealed the small entrance to it. There is no record to suggest that the admiral ever returned to reclaim the Glenora Treasure.

Is the Glenora Treasure still waiting somewhere high up on the cliff?

PREPARE FOR THE UPCOMING WINTER SEASON

November 20, 2023

The County of Prince Edward is encouraging all County residents to prepare for the upcoming winter season.

"We hope that there isn't another winter storm like we had last December, but we all need to be ready for the worst that Mother Nature can throw at us," Fire Chief Chad Brown says. "Assembling emergency kits, following the direction of public safety officials, and knowing what to do in a <u>power outage</u> is very important as we head into the winter months." Winter storm preparedness includes knowing what to do before, during and after the storm:

- Residents are encouraged to create or review their emergency plans to protect themselves and their families.
- Households should have a two-week supply of food and water as well as medications. For more tips on preparing for winter storms please click <u>here</u>.
- Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February. Test all smoke and carbon monoxide alarms monthly.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries on hand and never use candles.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Wear extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least three feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed. <u>Click</u> <u>here for more winter fire safety tips.</u>

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


