Although June 2025 is my absolute, final, 10 year deadline as NN editor, there are other things I would really like to do and experience, plus it's time for a fresh, new perspective so that means...

NO NEED TO WAIT... You are welcome to take over any of the tasks anytime now. It can be as 'bare bones' or copious as you choose. It's a fun job (if it wasn't, I wouldn't have done it for so long). And it's a great way to make a valuable contribution to our community, on your own time and from anywhere (even Snowbirds!). You can have as much or as little help as you wish/need. However if no one steps up before June 2025 there is no guarantee that I will be available to help. The position could be split up amongst different volunteers for different tasks/duties, or some of the duties could be eliminated:

Editor:

- Organize and create monthly NN & calendar using Publisher or other suitable program.
- Remove, revise or add advertisements each month.
- Send out mid-month deadline reminders to advertisers who change their ad monthly, resident groups who provide a different article each month, etc.
- Check for/confirm residents (current or past) who have passed away for condolences page.
- Send NN and calendar to post on website (and link to advertisers and WOLRA members.)
- Send NN to Printcraft.

Creation of Advertisements & Event Posters:

• Occasional ad creations and event posters (position filled).

Researcher:

• Look for interesting information, news, humour, entertainment, and events in the County that might be of interest to residents, including any news stories involving WOTL residents and send to the NN editor.

Photographer (cell phone is fine):

• Attend WOTL events, take photographs, send photos to the webmaster for posting on the website and the NN editor for the NN.

Proofreader (s): One current PR will continue, at least one more needed.

Delivery:

- One person to keep NN delivery list updated.
- One person to pick up NN from Printcraft in Picton, split up and bag for delivery people.
- Delivery people (1 + 1 backup): Delivery of print NN at the end of each month (approx. 35 to residents without computers, with medical issues or have paid for delivery) and deposit remainder in RC library.


Here is the plan:

We will issue a Special Eblast to inform everyone of the date that the new website will be "turned on" and open to everyone. FLOWERS AREN'T THE ONLY THING COMING THIS MAY

Dr. Blackbyrne is delighted to be joining the wonderful team of Family Physicians in Prince Edward County. She and her family have been residing here for the last few years, and she is excited to be practicing in the community she calls home.

While Dr. Blackbyrne was born and raised in Toronto, the County has really rubbed off on her and her family. They now have a small hobby farm of 6 chickens, 5 sheep, 2 dogs and a horse.

When not practicing medicine, Dr. Blackbyrne enjoys spending time with her family, getting her hands dirty in the garden, looking after her animals and travelling.



RECRUITMENT NEWS

County Docs has a lot of exciting news to report! Let's start with some highlights:

- 1. Dr. Mary-Kathryn Blackbyrne will be joining our physician team in May 2024
- We have confirmation that another physician will be joining our team in June 2024. We will be able to release her name soon.
- County Docs successfully launched its Health Care Connect Premium Pilot Program. Keep reading for those details.

Our Health Care Connect Premium Pilot Program (that's a mouthful!) aims to support physicians with onboarding large volumes of patients at once. Typically, this is done in small numbers over time, as it's very time consuming, both clinically and administratively. With this premium, physicians will be able to roster 250 patients at once, using the premium to offset the additional clinical and admin costs. PEC Council provided funding for four premiums, and all four have already been spoken for. That's 1000 patients that will come off the Health Care Connect list! Rostering will begin this month and is expected to continue into the Fall. We plan to go back to PEC Council for additional funding, so stay tuned for those updates.

In terms of recruitment events, County Docs attended all three of our targeted events this past quarter. The Family Medicine Resident Retreat for the University of Western Ontario, the job fair for Queens' Family Medicine Residency program, and the Review Course in Family Medicine in Toronto all yielded some strong leads.

CURRENT STATE

With the addition of Dr. Blackbyrne, we'll have six physician opportunities in PEC. We had one community visit by a prospective physician this past quarter and are currently following a total of 37 leads in varying degrees of interest and readiness. We consider nine of these to be high potential and are following them very closely.

Frequently Asked Question

Q: Why is there such a shortage of family doctors across the country?

A: This is a complicated question, and there are a couple answers. Simply put, there is an increased demand and decreased supply. Fewer medical students are choosing to specialize in Family Medicine due to the high administrative burden, the costs associated with starting and running a practice, and the remuneration compared to other specialties. An older gentleman was on the operating table awaiting surgery and he insisted that his daughter, a renowned surgeon, perform the operation. As he was about to get the anesthesia, he asked to speak to his daughter. "Yes, Dad, what is it?" "Don't be nervous, dear; do your best, and just remember, if it doesn't go well, if something happens to me, your mother is going to come and live with you and your husband..." *Contributed by Paul Denault*

Prince Edward County Memorial Hospital (PECMH) in Picton is a little rural hospital with big plans. At the moment the facility – which lives under the Quinte Health umbrella along with its three sister facilities in Belleville, Trenton and North Hastings – has 23 in-patient beds plus an Emergency Department and offers multiple diagnostic services and minor surgery.

A decade-long redesign project is nearing its next stage. The project, supported by the Prince Edward County Memorial Hospital Foundation, includes a new state-of-the-art hospital. Shovels are expected to hit the ground this year, with the new facility opening in 2027.



Access to the pool

Residents with disabilities can ride their scooter/wheelchairs to the pool area. At this time, it is not possible to use the recreation centre entrance/exit to reach the pool area.

Keys to the pool enclosure are located in the men's and women's change room. When opening the enclosure, please return the key to the change room immediately. The **last person in the pool area** is requested to lock the enclosure gate.

Rules and Regulations

The pool is open from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm.

In 2020, there is no lifeguard on duty. Consequently, up to 10 persons dressed for bathing are allowed within the glass enclosure. Swim at your own risk.

No glassware to be used on deck. Please do not take lounge chairs in the pool area.

All guests must be accompanied by a resident. Bathers under 12 years of age are not allowed within the pool enclosure unless accompanied by a parent or his or her agent who is not less than 16 years of age.

The buoyant line must be tied at all times except during lap periods. During designated lap periods, everyone in contact with the water must be doing laps, whether the lifeguard is present or not.

Jumping or boisterous play is not allowed in or around the pool.

No person infected with communicable disease or having open sores on their body shall enter the pool.

No person shall pollute the water in any manner. **Spitting, spouting of water and blowing the nose** in the pool or on deck are prohibited. Babies with a **swim diaper** are allowed in the pool.

Each bather shall take a shower using warm water and soap and throughly rince off all soap before entering or re-entering the deck. Use oils and skinblock only after you have finished swimming.
